A few Reminders from the Health Office:

Student Athletes must have an up-to-date physical to participate, and it must be within 12 months of the day the season begins to be considered valid. (it's okay if it expires mid-season, it will be valid for the rest of that season)

- **SPRING SPORTS**

- **PHYSICALS** will be held on March 9th. If your student-athlete does not have a current physical on file or it will expire before the start of the season, they are responsible for signing up for a school physical or handing in a physical before the season begins to participate.

- If your child has been referred for their vision or hearing, please make sure to communicate with me when they've had their appointments and the outcomes.
- Many illnesses have and will continue to circulate; please keep your child(ren) home when not feeling well to help decrease the spread.
- If your child displays any COVID-19 symptoms, please do a home COVID-19 test before returning. If positive, please let me know so we can review the return to school protocol. *Home COVID-19 test kits are still available from the Main Office should you need any.*





Trip A: The Raquette River Classic: Long Lake to Crusher, July 4-8. The classic trip from Long Lake Boat Launch, through Long Lake and down the Raquette River offers 30 miles of paddling and a 1.25 mile carry over 4 days. Open to participants of all skill levels. (Recommended ages: 10-15)

Trip B: The Tri-lakes Challenge: Upper Saranac to Tupper Lake, July 11-15. This trip follows the Raquette River via Stoney Creek Ponds past the Crusher out to Tupper Lake. Paddle from river to two of the larger lakes in this region. Open to participants of all skill levels. (Recommended ages: 10-15)

Trip C: The Ouluska Pass Challenge: Hiking Trip from Upper Works to Long Lake, Aug. 1-5. Hike begins at the Upper Works Trailhead into Duck Hole, then follows the Cold River for 12 miles as it winds towards the Raquette River. Hikers travel through the area where the hermit Noah John Rondeau lived; there will be opportunities for side trips to look for signs of him and the Santa Clara Lumber company in Ouluska Pass. This trip is intended for older and more experienced participants, who are ready to put their skills and physical fitness to the test. (Recommended ages: 13 and older)

NYS Department of Environmental Conservation Camps

Cost: \$350 per camp

Camps offer week-long adventures in conservation education for children ages 11-17. DEC operates four residential camps for children: Camp Colby in Saranac Lake (Franklin County); Camp DeBruce in Livingston Manor (Sullivan County); Camp Rushford in Caneadea (Allegany County), and Camp Pack Forest in Warrensburg (Warren County). Opening specific camps is dependent on staff availability.

Campers will have the opportunity to participate in fishing, bird watching, fly-tying, archery, canoeing, hiking, camping, orienteering, and hunter safety education. DEC campers engage in fun, hands-on activities and outdoor exploration focused on field, forest, stream, and pond ecological principles. Trips to nearby State lands might include kettle bogs, State Parks, fish hatcheries, or nature museums.

Camp Pack Forest will offer "Outdoor Adventure Week" during Week 4 (July 23-28). DEC encourages teens aged 14-17 to sign up for this popular program. During this week, campers may be engaged in team and trust-building activities, forestry, citizen science, conservation science, and more. Guest DEC and natural resource professionals will introduce campers to a variety of career options.

All four camps offer at least six one-week sessions (Sunday to Friday) beginning July 2, 2023; Camp Colby, Rushford, and Pack Forest will operate for seven weeks. One week of camp remains \$350 per child for 2023, and includes meals, trips, and a camp t-shirt.

A ten day back-country canoe trip for “young people...who have been identified as leaders in their own communities, or as having strong potential to become leaders. They should exhibit a strong desire to positively contribute to the program as well as an intention to bring home lessons of their experience to schools, families, and communities.”

Parents must transport to/from Toronto or Ottawa, however the trip is FREE.

The Hudson River Source-to-Sea Expedition: a Human -powered Odyssey and Water Examination of the Entire Hudson River (Pilot project)

Dates: July 17-Aug 1 Open to boys age 17 or close to 17 8 Boys selected to participate in this citizen's science expedition testing water quality of the Hudson River. 1-2 boys will be from the North Creek region.

The ideal candidate is someone who can get along with others, put up with expedition difficulties, has some interest in science and general learning, and is physically able to do the trip.

The route: Adk Loj to Mt. Marcy summit and Lake Tear of the Clouds, follow the river by hiking, and then rafts to North River, then kayaks to Albany area. Bike the rest of the way from Albany. Water quality testing along the entire route.

There will be 20 in the group: Adult guides, 8 teens, and a film crew. Filmmaker John Barnhardt (“Born to Explore.”), backed by Sierra Club, Adirondack Watershed Institute, and the Explorer Club in NYC. A documentary film of the Source To Sea expedition will be made.
