Superintendent's Corner Corner

Feasibility Study

At the January 17 meeting, the feasibility committee discussed course offerings, future building use, and transportation. CASDA presented information they had gathered to the group, facilitating a general discussion. The group broke into two smaller groups to take information and develop possible plans for the merged district.

Both groups agreed that both school buildings should be used if the districts were to merge. They talked about different combinations of grade levels at the two buildings and what the advantages of each were.

When they talked about transportation, they realized that no student was on a bus for longer than 40 minutes in either district under normal road conditions at the present time. It was also discussed that the two schools are less than 7 miles apart and that the time to travel between the schools is less than 10 minutes. (This is known because both schools do this almost nightly due to our merged sports program.)

The last thing discussed was the curriculum at both schools. This included offerings that each school had at the present time, as well as what may be able to be offered in the future if the schools were to merge. For example, Minerva has a Technology teacher

(for the older generation, this would be known as a shop teacher), but Johnsburg does not. Johnsburg has a Family Consumer Teacher (again, for the older generation, this would be known as a Home Economics teacher.), and Minerva does not. If the two schools were to merge, it would bring both programs together for all students. Other differences were discussed, showing how a merged district would help both schools academically.


The next Feasibility meeting is January 31st and the topics to be discussed at this meeting are Elementary program alignment, athletics, contract comparisons, and district financial information.

The Governor's Budget.

If you are following the Governor's budget proposal, you will already know that she has removed the "Save Harmless" law from the school budget process. This law states that schools affected negatively by the school aid formula will not see a decrease in their foundation aid from the prior year. This has been the lifeline for all rural schools as enrollment has decreased. The governor took that safety net away this year, and our district lost \$550,000.

Now, it is up to our legislatures to turn this around. They still have the negotiation power to change this proposal and give us and approximately 400 other school districts back their aid. It is essential to know that this does not include an increase; we all know that everything has increased in cost. Be assured that I am lobbying our legislatures to take action. The State Budget deadline is April 1st, but it is often later than this when they come out with the final passed budget.



Incoming Prekindergarten at JCS

If your child(ren) will be 4 years old prior to December 1, 2024, they are eligible to attend prekindergarten during the 2024-2025 school year. Please call Laurie West in the main office at 518-251-2921 to register your child for pre-k. After you call, you will be sent a packet of information to fill out and return to the guidance office. Your child will be placed on a list indicating whether you prefer an AM or PM session, if it becomes necessary to have two sessions of pre-k. We cannot guarantee that your child will be placed in the session that you prefer. Placement will be determined by a first come, first-served basis. Please fill out and return your packets as soon as possible.

Incoming Kindergarten at JCS

If your child(ren) will be 5 years old prior to December 1, 2024, they are eligible to attend kindergarten during the 2024-2025 school year. If your child currently attends pre-k at JCS, your child will be automatically registered for kindergarten. If your child is not currently enrolled in pre-k at JCS, please call Laurie West in the main office at 518-251-2921 as soon as possible.

- If your child displays any COVID-19 symptoms, please do a home COVID-19 test before returning. If positive, please let me know so we can review the return to school protocol.

Guidelines for Keeping Children Home from School Due to Illness Johnsburg Central School



It is sometimes difficult to decide when or how long to keep a sick child home from school. A child needs to stay home from school if they could possibly spread disease to others and/or are too sick themselves to function in a school setting. Please use the following guidelines for your child(ren).

Fever: If your child's temperature is 100 degrees Fahrenheit or above, they may not remain in school. A child **MUST** be fever-free for a mandatory 24 hours, without fever reducing medication, before returning to school.

Cough: If your child has a serious cough, particularly if it is accompanied by breathing trouble, keep your child home from school and consider seeing a doctor.

Sore Throat: If your child complains of a sore throat accompanied by a fever, they must be seen by a doctor before returning to school. If they have been diagnosed with strep throat and placed on antibiotics, they must remain home until fever free for 24 hours (without the use of fever reducing medication) **and** have been on the antibiotics for at least 24 hours.

Diarrhea/Vomiting: If your child has vomited and/or has had diarrhea (6 or more loose stools) within 24 hours, they should remain home. Remember, your child may feel better after vomiting but should still be kept home for 24 hours.

Rashes: Skin rashes of an unknown origin should be evaluated by a doctor before sending your child to school.

Pinkeye: Your child should remain home from school until receiving 24 hours of antibiotic therapy and discharge from the eye has stopped.

Head Lice: Your child is not allowed to be in school if live lice are present. They must be treated for lice before returning to school.

If your child was seen by their health care provider, it is necessary to provide a return to school note upon returning to school. The JCS fax number is (518) 251-2367.

academic achievement, financial need, and personal goals.

5. Crary Education Fund Scholarship –

This renewable scholarship valued up to \$1,300 is for a high school senior living in Clinton, Essex, Franklin, Hamilton, or Warren County who will be enrolling in a vocational program or college. Exceptions to surpassing this limit will be considered but must be justified in writing by providing specific information on the number of children in the household, the number attending college, or any unusual financial circumstances.
