I attended concerts and events, and people followed the rules. I know that some people do not agree with what we have to do, but I am pleased that they are helping us figure this out. Once again, thank you, and as I have said before, this too will become part of history, and we will say that we got through it.

The Gerard J. Buckenmeyer FASNY Volunteer Scholarship program is made possible each June through the generous donations of individuals, fire departments and auxiliaries. The awards recognize exemplary members of the youth fire service who also contribute to their communities.

CRITERIA

Applicants must:

- Be a member in good standing with FASNY or have a parent/legal guardian who is a member.
- Attend high school as a senior who is enrolled in the fall 2022 school year at an accredited two- or four-year institution of higher learning or an accredited technical post-secondary school.
- Serve as a current Junior firefighter, Explorer Scout or RAM in a group affiliated with a volunteer department; a volunteer firefighter; or a volunteer with an EMS unit.
- Demonstrate a commitment to both volunteer emergency service and the community.

Please note – your fire company's membership in FASNY does not automatically make an individual a member of FASNY. Eligibility for this program requires current individual membership in FASNY.

5. Hudson Mohawk-AHEC 2021 Health Career

Scholarship- Scholarships of \$500 each will be awarded to high school seniors who are entering an approved healthcarerelated program at a local community college and/or a certification program. Applicants must be a graduating senior from a high school within the HM-AHEC ten-county service region, which includes: Albany Essex, Fulton, Hamilton, Montgomery, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Warren and, Washington counties. Recipients are expected to participate in at least one informative two-hour health careers exploration program and be able to help present it at a local high school after completing their certificate program or freshman year of college. Students may be eligible to re-apply in a subsequent year, which is to be based on performance and funding. Winners will be chosen from the applicants who have submitted completed applications with all necessary paperwork in their entirety by the posed deadline of noon on Friday, March 18, 2022. Priority will be given to applicants living and intending to work in either medically underserved areas or health professional shortage areas. Applications must include a completed application, high school transcript, and acceptance letters to college or certificate program, and a 200-word essay.

6. Adirondack Runners Club Scholarship

Plumbers Union Local 773, located at

37 Luzerne Road in Queensbury is accepting applications for an apprenticeship. Applications are taken on the second Monday of the month. An application, aptitude test, and an interview are required. Applicants with medium and high aptitude scores get interviewed. The apprenticeship is half on the job training and half classroom related instruction. There are 1,800 hours of hands on work and 246 hours of classroom work, all of which is set by the state. The cost is \$150 per year for five years for this apprenticeship program. This union is looking for pipefitters, millwrights, and electricians. They are looking to hire people 18 years old or older.

Physical & Vaccine Requirements:

It is hard to believe but I am looking into next school year and would like to remind parents/guardians that if your child is entering grades PK, Kindergarten, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, or 11 that an up to date physical is required within 12 months of the upcoming school year starting on 09/06/2022 (meaning the physical would have to be on or after 09/06/2021 to be considered valid). I encourage you to schedule these physicals starting now as it may take several weeks/months to get in. Also, entering Kindergarten, 6th, 7th, and 12th grades there are specific vaccine requirements, if you are unsure if your child is up to date, please contact me. I will start mailing letters home next month for any student due for either a physical or vaccines.

COVID-19:

A very welcomed change is the ability to accept athome COVID-19 test kits. This has simplified the process of clearing students to return and has significantly reduced the number of days students are absent related to an illness that is not COVID-19. The amount of COVID-19 cases not only in our school but the community has dropped significantly which is helping our return to more normal times. This in turn seems to be helping the mental wellbeing of our youth which is just as important as their physical health. Here is to hoping we continue down this path of returning to normalcy!

Spring Sports Physicals needed:

If your child is planning to play a spring sport, please remember they must have a physical on file within 12 months of the start of the season. Also, a health interval form must be completed by a parent or guardian within 30days of the season and prior to the athlete being able to participate in practice. These forms can be picked up from either PE coach and are also available in the health office.




