Superintendent's Corner



What a beautiful fall we have had so far. Many of the days have been warm, and the nights and leaves both have a crispness to them. Once again, the mountains gave us a beautiful palette of color, and as always, there is no better place to see this than on our athletic fields. On another note, if you have a child taking Spanish, you already know that we could not find a teacher to take Mr. Gilbertson's position. So, if your child is interested in teaching when they get out into the work field, there should be jobs available.

I am also excited to let you know that we have hired a new School Social Worker. Many of you know Mr. Joseph San Antonio, who has taken the position. He has worked for several years in the field and brings with him experiences that will help our students. His work with adolescents and leadership experiences for students will give our students opportunities that they have not had in the past. He will be working with both students and families as they work their way through school.

Lastly, I would like to wish everyone a very Happy Thanksgiving. I hope you have an opportunity to spend it with family and loved ones. After a very long year and half of COVID filling our lives with so much uncertainty, take time and think about all the things you have to be thankful for. On my list of things to be thankful for is being part of such a great community here at Johnsburg.

FAQs:

What is Dollars for SCHOLARS?

A non-profit organization designed to offer financial awards to graduating seniors who plan to attend college or technical school.

Who is eligible to receive the scholarship money?

Any JCS graduating senior attending a 4-year or 2-year college or technical school who has earned credits by volunteering for JDFS events and has submitted an application through Scholarship America.

How many credits do I need to be eligible for an award?

The usual minimum requirement is 4 credits, which equals 8 volunteer hours.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, this number will be reduced to 3 for the class of 2022.

Is it hard to apply for a scholarship?

No! It just requires creating a profile and filling out an application on the Scholarship America website. We will host additional evenings in January and March to help students create and work on their profiles.

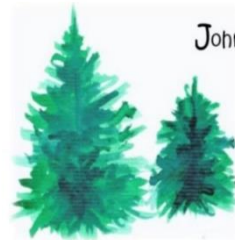

This will be a good opportunity for parents to hear information from the school's Athletic Directors regarding COVID protocols for indoor and outdoor sports and essential information for spectators. All student athletes, coaches, and spectators must understand and follow the COVID protocols to keep our students healthy and our school and athletic programs running.

We are also in the process of setting up our elementary basketball program. It is important to make sure your child is prepared for physical education class with cold weather approaching. We will be taking the students outside as often as possible. Our lower elementary physical education program has been working on locomotor skills such as skipping, hopping, jumping, galloping, and running. They have been practicing how to move around safely in a large and small areas. The next units will develop their throwing and catching skills. October proved to be a very busy month here at Johnsburg. Fall sports are wrapped up, and Winter sports will begin 11/15/21. Remember to make sure I have an updated physical on file for your student athlete; please do not assume that I do; this is a requirement in order to participate.

Asthma and Allergies have certainly been prominent lately. I would encourage you to discuss any concerns with your child's primary health care provider. It is essential to provide proper documentation of diagnoses such as environmental allergies and asthma. Along with an order for an inhaler for school use if your child is ordered to have one.

Please keep your child(ren) home if they exhibit any of the following:

- Fever > or equal to 100 degrees Fahrenheit or Feeling feverish or with chills
- Loss of taste or smell
- Fatigue/feeling of tiredness
- Sorethroat
- Shortness of breath or trouble breathing
- Nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea (6 or more loose stools in a 24hour period)
- body aches and headaches
- Nasal congestion/runny nose and or cough

If your child has a chronic condition/diagnosis that could cause any of these symptoms, please provide documentation from their health care provider. At times this is helpful to avoid unnecessary testing/missed days of school. However, if the symptoms appear to be infectious and not potentially from the chronic condition, testing will still be required.

The following information is from the NYS Department of Health, Commissioner's

Determination on COVID-19 Testing Pursuant to 10 NYCRR 2.62:

Requirements for Return to School Testing:

a. All school students, teachers, and staff with new or worsening symptoms of COVID-19 **must** be excluded from school, regardless of vaccination status, and either (a) provide a negative COVID test result or (b) remain excluded from school for a minimum of 10 calendar days from symptom onset, prior to returning to school. If student, teacher, or staff symptoms are improving AND they are fever-free for at least 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medicines, they may return to school with either a note from the healthcare provider indicating the test was negative OR a copy of the negative test result. Given the growing prevalence of breakthrough infections among vaccinated populations nationwide, there is no recommended exemption for symptomatic vaccinated people.

It is also required that no student or staff be allowed to return to the building if there is a pending COVID-19 test. If the facility orders a Rapid test and a PCR (send out test), we must have the student/staff remain home until all tests have returned as negative.

We can all help protect and strengthen our immune systems by eating nutritious meals, getting plenty of rest, taking walks or exercising in various ways, and by trying to reduce daily stress.

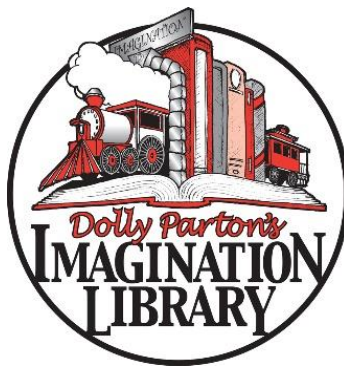

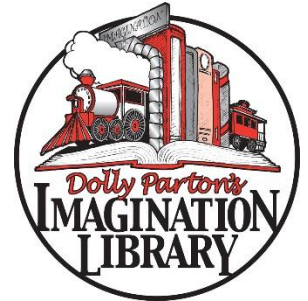

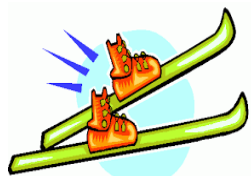
